INFRASTRUCTURE in MONTANA

Purpose – The Montana Infrastructure proposal provides the legislature the opportunity to create jobs by completing state infrastructure projects throughout Montana.

Executive Recommendation –

- The 2027 Biennium Montana Infrastructure proposal is comprised of general obligation bonds, state special revenue, federal special revenue, and bond funds. Table F-1 shows the state programs and the funding, required for the proposal.
- Following the chart below, each program provides a list of projects and more details about the program.
- State funding includes agency contributions of SSR, and SSR bonds totaling \$318,905,279
- FSR included in projects totals \$93,817,655
- Long Range funding included in the bill \$479,882,846
- Authority only projects contribute \$76,250,000 to the bill.

Purpose - The Long-Range Building Program (LRBP) was initiated in 1965 to provide funding for construction and major maintenance of state buildings. The LRBP was developed in order to present a single, comprehensive and prioritized plan for allocating state resources for capital construction and maintenance of state-owned facilities. Primary statutory authority is Title 17, Chapter 7, part 2, MCA.

Executive Recommendations –

- Volume 3 of the Governor's 2027 Biennium Executive Budget contains complete descriptions of all recommended projects.
 - Table F-2 shows Long-Range Building Major Repair Account revenue and funding proposal.
 - Table F-3 shows Long-Range Building Program Major Repair projects.

- The LRBP Major Repair category contains \$44,365,000 in cash revenue projects (minimum of \$42,253,842 in appropriations are required per 17-7-222 MCA), \$0 state special revenue, \$6,310,000 federal special revenue, and \$300,000 authority-only requests in HB 5 for a total of \$50,975,000.
- The LRBP Capital Development category consist of \$397,315,000 in cash revenue projects, \$115,292,500 state special revenue, \$81,442,500 federal special revenue, and \$75,950,000 authority-only requests to be funded in HB 5 for a total of \$670,000,000.
- Authority-only requests are for projects that have or will receive funding that does not require an appropriation.
- Funding is requested for 56 Major Repair projects and 83 Capital Development projects in HB 5 for a total of 190 projects.
- Major Repair components include a continuation of the mandatory Facility Condition Assessment baseline effort and feasibility study funding to assist agencies with the determining proper project scope for repairs.
- Within Capital Developments, funding is requested to provide capital project planning studies to assist agencies with 6-year strategic planning and right-sizing project scopes to provide improved cost estimates for future requests.
- Volume 3 includes a listing of all LRBP project requests submitted by Agencies for the 2027 biennium.

Purpose - The Renewable Resource Grant and Loan (RRGL) Program offers funding for projects that conserve, manage, develop, and preserve renewable resources to provide economic and other benefits of the state's natural heritage. The Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC) administers the program, which is provided for in Title 85, Chapter 1, part 6, MCA. Governmental entities may apply to the program to obtain funding for community resource-related projects. Project eligibility includes irrigation system rehabilitation, stream restoration, watershed management, public water and sewer systems, and resource assessment projects.

Executive Recommendation -

- Volume 6 of the Governor's 2027 biennium Executive Budget contains the complete project evaluations and funding recommendations for all grant and loan applications. Table F-5A and F-5B shows the projects recommended for funding.
- RRGL infrastructure project grant awards are included in HB 6 and will be funded with an appropriation of \$5,250,000 and irrigation project grant awards will be funded with an appropriation of \$3,474,500 of natural resource projects state special revenue account (SSRA) funds.
- RRGL recommends provision for \$2,000,000 for project planning grants, \$500,000 in emergency grants to communities with projects that present immediate threats to public health, \$500,000 for irrigation grants, \$150,000 for private grants, and \$1,000,000 for nonpoint source pollution reduction grants. HB 6 will appropriate \$4,150,000 of natural resource projects SSRA funds for these small grant programs during the 2027 biennium. Table F-5C shows the program grants included in House Bill 6.

- Irrigation Development Grants 7 grants are contracted or completed for \$225,643; and

Reclamation and Development Grants Program RDGP

Purpose - The Reclamation and Development Grants Program (RDGP) was established by the Montana Legislature in 1987 to enable funding for projects that indemnify the people of Montana for the effects of mineral development on public resources and that meet other crucial needs serving the public interest and the total environment of the citizens of Montana. Administered by the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC), the RDGP fulfills this mission by funding projects that (1) repair, reclaim, and mitigate environmental damage to public resources from nonrenewable resource extraction, and (2) develop and ensure the quality of public resources for the benefit of all Montanans. The RDGP Act is Title 90, Chapter 2, part 11, MCA.

Executive Recommendation -

- Volume 5 of the Governor's 2027 biennium Executive Budget contains the complete project evaluations and funding recommendations for the RDGP. Table F-6 shows the funded projects.
- RDGP presents the reclamation and development grant awards that will be funded with an appropriation of \$7,110,975 in state special revenue.
 - Representative mining/mineral reclamation projects include the restoration of Upper Little Blackfoot Mining Complex to reduce metal contamination and mine tailing erosion in the Little Blackfoot River, and replacement of the Landusky Biological Treatment Plant to ensure mine impacted water is treated before discharging into Montana Gulch. Non-mineral, hazardous waste projects include contaminated soil cleanup at the Milwaukee Roundhouse.
 - Crucial state need projects include the DNRC owned Willow Creek Dam rehabilitation, Painted Rocks Dam rehabilitation, and East Fork of Rock Creek Dam rehabilitation, Cooke City's Sewer System project, Ruby Valley Conservation District's Upper Ruby River Habitat Rehabilitation and Granite County's Flint Creek Watershed Resiliency and Drought Mitigation project.
- House Bill 7 also includes an appropriation for \$1,500,000 for Reclamation Development Planning Grants and \$5,300,000 for water storage pilot project planning, design and implementation to address drought.

Since the Last Session - RDG Program to date - 2025 Biennium:

- 10 grantees that received appropriations through HB 7 from the 68th Legislature have started their projects for a total of \$3,653,347.
- 15 planning grants have been awarded for a total of \$911,563.

Renewable Resource Loans and Coal Severance Tax Bonds

Purpose – Department of Natural Resources (DNRC) is authorized to make loans to political subdivision and local governments to help finance renewable resource projects.

Executive Recommendation –

- RRGL recommends reauthorization for sixteen renewable resource loans and associated bonds. Currently, there
 are seven new projects that will need loans funded by bonds and nine projects that are requesting reauthorization.
 Included is the DNRC Conservation and Resource Development, request for \$8,000,000 to make loans to local
 governments to construct infrastructure projects or to refinance existing debt, resulting in significant savings to
 communities in interest costs on existing loans. Table F-7 shows the full request for the 2027 Biennium.
- Included is a 10% reserve on the coal severance bonds of \$12,119,844.

Purpose - The Montana Coal Endowment Program (MCEP) is a state-funded grant program created to help local governments fund infrastructure projects, defined by statute as drinking water systems, wastewater treatment, sanitary sewer or storm sewer systems, solid waste disposal and separation systems, and bridges. MCEP was authorized by Montana voters through the passage of Legislative Referendum 110 in June 1992 (Sections 90-6-701, *et seq.*, MCA). Title 90, Chapter 6, Part 7, MCA sets out the basic requirements for MCEP. Administered by the Montana Department of Commerce, the mission of MCEP is to assist local governments in funding infrastructure projects that will:

- create jobs for Montana residents;
- promote economic growth in Montana by helping to finance the necessary infrastructure;
- encourage local public facility improvements;
- create a partnership between the state and local governments to make necessary public projects affordable;
- support long-term, stable economic growth in Montana;
- protect future generations from undue fiscal burdens caused by financing necessary public works;
- coordinate and improve infrastructure financing by federal, state, local government, and private sources; and
- enhance the quality of life and protect the health, safety, and welfare of Montana citizens.

Executive Recommendation

Volume 4 of the Governor's 2027 Biennium Executive Budget contains the department's evaluation of each of the MCEP applications and detailed funding recommendations.

- For the 2027 biennium, 44 applicants are requesting \$26,707,141 million in project grant funds.
- The department recommends two lists of projects for MCEP infrastructure grant funds one list for 33 eligible infrastructure projects (table **F-8**) and the other for 6 eligible bridge projects (table **F-9**). The tables list each project and the recommended grant award.
- The 6 bridge projects and 33 other infrastructure projects are included in HB 11 with an appropriation of \$23,832,141 in state special revenue.
- The department recommends \$1,500,000 for matching infrastructure planning grants and \$150,000 for emergency projects during the 2027 biennium, which are included in HB 11.
- The MCEP administration appropriation for \$1,683,867 is in HB 2.

Since the Last Session

As of November 1, 2023:

- 52 grantees were awarded funds from the 68th Legislature in HB 11 and HB 14. HB 632 authorized eligible project funding to replace special revenue interest earnings with American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds. These eligible projects included 41 water, wastewater, combined water and wastewater, and storm drain projects. Seven bridge projects were not eligible for ARPA and were funded through the special revenue interest earnings.
- 46 of the 48 grantees that received MCEP funding from the 67th Legislature in HB 11 or HB 14 (subsequently HB632) have met start up conditions for a total obligation of \$25,603,718.
- The department has awarded 4 emergency grants for a total of \$99,930.
- The department has awarded 29 planning grants for a total of \$900,000.
- The department has also awarded 53 ARPA MCEP planning grants for a total of \$1,892,940.

MCEP Regional Water Program RW

Purpose

The State of Montana, through the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC) provides financial support and state coordination for four regional water systems in Montana. When completed, the Rocky Boys-North Central, Fort Peck-Dry Prairie, Central Montana, and Dry Redwater systems will provide clean drinking water to more than 65 communities in central and northern Montana. Two of the regional water systems benefit from Tribal partnerships, and three are authorized by Congress. Dry Redwater is undergoing a feasibility study by the Department of Interior which would address the project cost, economic feasibility, and customer demands of the more than 22,500 residents.

Executive Recommendation

• Regional Water appropriates the state's share of regional water system construction funding. Grant funding is limited to \$10,000,000 of state revenue for administrative and construction grants to the regional water authorities.

Since the last session

- In the 2025 Biennium, the Dry Prairie Regional Water Authority completed work on delivery of water to the northwest corner of the Fort Peck Reservation. When the entire regional project is finished, over 3,000 miles of pipeline will deliver drinking water to more than 20 communities and nearly 4,000 farms, ranches and rural homes. The entire system should be complete by December 2025.
- The North Central Regional Water system has nearly completed work on the Phase 1 regional water treatment plant including the 50-mile-long core pipeline between Tiber Reservoir and the treatment plant located on the Rocky Boy Indian Reservation.
- The Central Montana Regional Water system has completed Phase 1 delivering water from the Ubet wellfield to Harlowton in 2023, Phase 2 which will deliver water to Roundup will be completed in 2025.
- The Dry Redwater Regional Water system has been working with Bureau of Reclamation to complete the updated feasibility study for the system. The system plans to work on the next pipeline segment in Richland County to serve water from Sidney to users in the system.

Purpose - The Montana Historic Preservation Grant (MHPG) is a state-funded grant program created to help private and public entities fund the preservation of historic sites, historical societies, and history museums across the state. MHPG was authorized by House Bill 338 during the 66th Legislative Session in 2019 (Sections 22-3-1305, et seq., MCA). Funding for MHPG grants comes from the Historic Preservation Grant Program account established in 17-2-102, MCA and is subject to appropriation by the legislature. As of January 1, 2020, tax collections allocated in 15-68-820(3)(b) and (4)(c) began depositing in the Historic Preservation Grant Program account. The basic requirements for MHPG are in Title 22, Chapter 3, Part 13, MCA. Administered by the Montana Department of Commerce, the mission of MHPG is to assist private and public entities in funding historic preservation projects that will demonstrate the following:

(a) the degree of economic stimulus or economic activity, including job creation and work creation for Montana contractors and service workers;

(b) the purpose of the project, including whether it provides features that establish or enhance security, climate control, or fire protection for museums or address infrastructure, maintenance, or building code issues;

(c) the timing of the project, including access to matching funds, if needed, and approval of permits so that work can be completed without delay;

(d) the historic or heritage value related to the state of Montana;

(e) the successful track record or experience of the organization directing the project;

(f) the expected ongoing economic benefit to the state as a result of the project completion;

(g) the local contribution; and

(h) the anticipated public benefit, including the extent the site or building will be open to the public and the degree of immediate facility use after public completion.

Executive Recommendation

Volume 8 of the Governor's 2027 Biennium Executive Budget contains the department's evaluation of each of the MHPG applications and the detailed advisory funding recommendations.

- For the 2027 biennium, 77 applicants requested \$25,793,250 in project grant funds.
- 63 projects are eligible to receive awards, totaling \$22,966,085.
- MHPG contains one list of projects with a recommended funding line of \$6,229,375 for 17 grants based on the anticipated revenue for the 2027 biennium (table **F-10**). The table lists each of the 63 projects and the recommended grant award.
- The department is requesting one FTE in HB 2 for the administration of the recommended projects.

Cultural and Aesthetic Grant Program

Purpose - The Cultural and Aesthetic (C&A) Grant Program began in the 1979 biennium for protection of works of art in the state capitol and for other cultural and aesthetic projects as provided in 15-35-108, and Title 22, Chapter 2, part 3, MCA. Initially administered by the Montana Historical Society (MHS), the C&A program was transferred to the Montana Arts Council (MAC) in the 1985 biennium and continues to be funded by the interest from a statutory trust that receives coal severance tax revenues. Project applications are submitted to the MAC for review and ranking by the 16-member Cultural and Aesthetic Projects Advisory Committee, half of whom are appointed by the MAC and half by the MHS.

Coal severance tax revenue of 0.63 percent is statutorily allocated to the capitol art protection trust fund for funding of the recommended grants. The recommended grant awards total is \$953,500 for the 2027 biennium.

Executive Recommendation -

- Volume 7 of the Governor's 2027 biennium Executive Budget contains the C&A project applications and advisory committee assessment information.
- HB 9 contains the projects recommended by the advisory committee for funding in the amount of \$953,500. Table **F-11** below shows the requested amount and recommended grant amounts.
- Projects are organized into three categories: special projects, operational support, and capital expenditure grants.
- The revenue estimate for cultural trust interest earnings for the 2027 biennium is \$1,428,000.
- Montana Arts Council administration and services are recommended for \$446,351 and appropriated in HB 2.
- Montana Historical Society is appropriated in HB 9 the first \$30,000 for Capitol Complex works of art.
- Language in HB 9 provides a mechanism for spending the funds within the total revenue available.

Long Range IT Program

Purpose - Montana's state law requires special handling of large technology projects in its budgeting process. According to state requirements, any technology project that exceeds \$500,000, or costs more than \$100,000 and represents 25% of an agency's technology budget, must be reviewed separately from other budget items to comply with 17-7-123(1), MCA.

The state manages technology funding through two different legislative bills. House Bill 2 covers the day-to-day technology operations and maintenance, representing the ongoing costs for regular state operations. In contrast, House Bill 10 handles new technology investments, treating these investments as infrastructure improvements as statutorily authorized in 2-17-560, MCA. This bill provides funding that continues until project completion, recognizing that complex technology projects often span multiple years.

This consolidated approach to managing major technology projects offers several important advantages. First, since these are designated as capital projects, funding remains available until the project is finished, which is crucial for complex, multiyear technology initiatives. Second, having projects managed centrally allows for improved project management and stronger collaboration between state agencies and the Chief Information Officer. Finally, by grouping major technology projects in one bill, legislators can better understand and evaluate the state's overall technology investment strategy.

This structured approach ensures that significant technology investments receive proper oversight while maintaining the flexibility needed to complete complex projects successfully. It also provides transparency in how the state manages and funds its technology infrastructure improvements.

Executive Recommendation -
